The motherboard comes with dual 1207-pin surface mount Land Grid Array (LGA) sockets coded Socket F, designed for AMD Opteron[™] 2000 series processors. The motherboard with the new socket supports registered DDR2-667/533 memory. delivering advanced performance and ensuring reliable data protection.

AMD Quad-Core Architecture



The motherboard supports AMD guad/dual-core processors with discrete L2 cache structure for each core and shared L3 cache to meet demands for more powerful computing.

PCI Express™ interface PCI>>

The motherboard fully supports PCI Express, the latest I/O interconnect technology that speeds up the PCI bus. PCI Express features point-to-point serial interconnections between devices and allows higher clockspeeds by carrying data in packets. This high speed interface is software compatible with existing PCI specifications.

HyperTransport[™] Technology ⁽[™])



HyperTransport[™] Technology is a high-speed, low latency, point-to-point link designed to increase the communication speed between integrated circuits in computers, networking and telecommunicatons equipment up to 48 times faster than other existing technologies.

DDR2 memory support



The motherboard supports DDR2 memory which features data transfer rates of 667 MHz or 533 MHz to meet the higher bandwidth requirements of the latest 3D graphics, multimedia, and Internet applications. The dual-channel DDR2 architecture doubles the bandwidth of your system memory to boost system performance, eliminating bottlenecks with peak bandwidth of up to 10.7 GB/s.

The motherboard implements the Universal Serial Bus (USB) 2.0 specification, dramatically increasing the connection speed from the 12 Mbps bandwidth on USB 1.1 to a fast 480 Mbps on USB 2.0. USB 2.0 is backward compatible with USB 1.1.

Temperature, fan, and voltage monitoring

The CPU temperature is monitored by the ASIC (Winbond W83793G) to prevent overheating and damage. The system fan rotations per minute (RPM) is monitored for timely failure detection. The ASIC monitors the voltage levels to ensure stable supply of current for critical components.

2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.




- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, before handling components to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, and/or components.

Onboard LED

1. Standby Power LED


The motherboard comes with a standby power LED. The green LED lights up to indicate that the system is ON, in sleep mode, or in soft-off mode. This is a reminder that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component. The illustration below shows the location of the onboard LED

2. SAS LED (for KFSN4-DRE/SAS only)

The green heartbeat LED blinks per second to indicate that the LSI 1064E chipset is working normally.




3. CPU warning LED (CPU_WARN1)

The CPU warning LED lights up to indicate that a processor is not installed or the processor is not installed properly in CPU 1 socket.

4. Memory warning LED (MEM_WARN1)

The memory warning LED lights up to indicate that there is no power in the memory DIMMs.



2.2 Motherboard overview

Before you install the motherboard, study the configuration of your chassis to ensure that the motherboard fits into it.

To optimize the motherboard features, we highly recommend that you install it in an SSI CEB 1.1 compliant chassis.




Make sure to unplug the chassis power cord before installing or removing the motherboard. Failure to do so can cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components!

2.2.1 Placement direction

When installing the motherboard, make sure that you place it into the chassis in the correct orientation. The edge with external ports goes to the rear part of the chassis as indicated in the image below.


2.2.2 Screw holes

Place ten (10) screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.





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2.3 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

The motherboard comes with dual surface mount Socket F designed for the AMD[®] Opteron[®] 2000 series CPU in the Land Grid Array (LGA) package.



	•	Upon purchase of the motherboard, make sure that the PnP cap is on
		the socket and the socket contacts are not bent. Contact your retailer
		immediately if the PnP cap is missing, or if you see any damage to the PnP
		cap/socket contacts/motherboard components. ASUS shoulders the repair

- Keep the cap after installing the motherboard. ASUS will process Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) requests only if the motherboard comes with the cap on the Socket 1207.
- The product warranty does not cover damage to the socket contacts resulting from incorrect CPU installation/removal, or misplacement/loss/ incorrect removal of the PnP cap.

2.3.1 Installing the CPU

To install a CPU:

1. Locate the CPU socket on the motherboard.




KFSN4-DRE Series CPU Socket 1207



Before installing the CPU, make sure that the socket box is facing toward you and the load lever is on your left.


Press the load lever with your thumb (A), then move it to the left (B) until it is 2. released from the retention tab.





To prevent damage to the socket pins, do not remove the PnP cap unless you are installing a CPU.

- 3. I ift the load lever in the direction of the arrow to a 135° angle.
- 4 Lift the load plate with your thumb and forefinger to a 100° angle (A). then push the PnP cap from the
- load plate window to remove (B).
- 5. Position the CPU over the socket, making sure that the gold triangle is on the bottom-right corner of the socket. The socket alignment keys should fit into the CPU notches.



Gold triangle mark



The CPU fits in only one correct orientation. DO NOT force the CPU into the socket to prevent bending the connectors on the socket and damaging the CPU!

6. Close the load plate (A), then push the load lever (B) until it snaps into the retention tab.



2.3.2 Installing the heatsink

The AMD Opteron[™] 2000 series processors require a specially designed heatsink to ensure optimum thermal condition and performance.



Make sure that you use only qualified heatsink assembly.

Follow these steps to install the CPU heatsink.

1. Place the heatsink on top of the installed CPU, making sure that the screw holes are matched with the heatsink standoffs.




2. Secure the heatsink with two screws.



Make sure that the heatsink is not skewed or tilted otherwise, the CPU will overheat.

 If you installed a second processor, repeat steps 1-2 to install the second heatsink.




2.4 System memory

2.4.1 Overview

The motherboard comes with sixteen (16) Double Data Rate 2 (DDR2) Dual Inline Memory Modules (DIMM) sockets.

A DDR2 module has the same physical dimensions as a DDR DIMM but has a 240-pin footprint compared to the 184-pin DDR DIMM. DDR2 DIMMs are notched differently to prevent installation on a DDR DIMM socket.

The figure illustrates the location of the DDR2 DIMM sockets:



2.4.2 Memory Configurations

You may install 256 MB, 512 MB, 1 GB, 2, or 4 GB registered ECC DDR2 DIMMs into the DIMM sockets using the memory configurations in this section.

- For dual-channel configuration, the total size of memory module(s) installed per channel must be the same for better performance. Single CPU: DIMM_A1=DIMM_A2=DIMM_B1=DIMM_B2 Dual CPU: DIMM_A1=DIMM_A2=DIMM_B1=DIMM_B2= DIMM_C1=DIMM_C2 =DIMM_D1=DIMM_D2
 - Always install DIMMs with the same CAS latency. For optimum compatibility, it is recommended that you obtain memory modules from the same vendor.


2.4.3 Installing a DIMM



Unplug the power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or other system components. Failure to do so can cause severe damage to both the motherboard and the components.

To install a DIMM:

- 1. Unlock a DIMM socket by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Align a DIMM on the socket such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the socket.
- Firmly insert the DIMM into the socket until the retaining clips snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.



Unlocked retaining clip



- A DDR2 DIMM is keyed with a notch so that it fits in only one direction. Do not force a DIMM into a socket to avoid damaging the DIMM.
- The DDR2 DIMM sockets do not support DDR DIMMs. Do not install DDR DIMMs to the DDR2 DIMM sockets.


2.4.4 Removing a DIMM

To remove a DIMM:

1. Simultaneously press the retaining clips outward to unlock the DIMM.



Support the DIMM lightly with your fingers when pressing the retaining clips. The DIMM might get damaged when it flips out with extra force.



2. Remove the DIMM from the socket.

2.5 Expansion slots

In the future, you may need to install expansion cards. The following sub-sections describe the slots and the expansion cards that they support.



Make sure to unplug the power cord before adding or removing expansion cards. Failure to do so may cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components.

2.5.1 Installing an expansion card

To install an expansion card:

- 1. Before installing the expansion card, read the documentation that came with it and make the necessary hardware settings for the card.
- 2. Remove the system unit cover (if your motherboard is already installed in a chassis).
- 3. Remove the bracket opposite the slot that you intend to use. Keep the screw for later use.
- 4. Align the card connector with the slot and press firmly until the card is completely seated on the slot.
- 5. Secure the card to the chassis with the screw you removed earlier.
- 6. Replace the system cover.

2.5.2 Configuring an expansion card

After installing the expansion card, configure the it by adjusting the software settings.

- 1. Turn on the system and change the necessary BIOS settings, if any. See Chapter 4 for information on BIOS setup.
- 2. Assign an IRQ to the card. Refer to the tables on the next page.
- 3. Install the software drivers for the expansion card.



When using PCI cards on shared slots, ensure that the drivers support "Share IRQ" or that the cards do not need IRQ assignments. Otherwise, conflicts will arise between the two PCI groups, making the system unstable and the card inoperable.




KFSN4-DRE Series PCI Express slot



The number of PCIE slot differs by model. The KFSN4-DRE/SAS comes with one PCIE x 16 slot (x 8link); the KFSN4-DRE/2S comes with two PCIE x 16 slot (x 8link); the KFSN4-DRE comes with one PCIE x 16 slot (x 16link).

2.5.5 BMC socket

2.6 Jumpers

1. Clear RTC RAM (CLRTC1)


This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of date, time, and system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.

To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Remove the onboard battery.
- 3. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 4. Reinstall the battery.
- 5. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 6. Hold down the key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to re-enter data.




Except when clearing the RTC RAM, NEVER remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!



KFSN4-DRE Series Clear RTC RAM


2. Gigabit LAN1 controller setting (3-pin LAN1_EN1, LAN2_EN1)

These jumpers allow you to enable or disable the onboard Broadcom[®] BCM5721 Gigabit LAN1/2 controller. Set to pins 1-2 to activate the Gigabit LAN feature.




3. VGA Graphics controller setting (3-pin VGA_EN1)

This jumper allows you to enable or disable the onboard ATI ES1000 video graphics controller. Set to pins 1-2 to enable the video graphics controller.



4. Fan control setting (3-pin FAN_SEL1)

This jumper allows you to switch for fan pin selection. Set to pins 1-2 for 4-pin fans or pins 2-3 for 3-pin fans.




KFSN4-DRE Series Fan setting

- If you use a 4-pin fan but set the jumper to pin 2-3, the fan you installed may not work.
- If you use a 3-pin fan but set the jumper for a 4-pin fan, the fan controll will not work and the fan you installed will always run at full speed.

5. Onboard storage setting (3-pin SAS_EN1) (KFSN4-DRE/SAS model only)

This jumper allows you to enable or disable the onboard LSI1064E SAS controller. Set the jumper to pins 1-2 to enable the SAS function (default).




6. Force BIOS recovery setting (3-pin RECOVERY1)

This jumper allows you to quickly update or recover the BIOS settings when it becomes corrupted.

To update the BIOS:


- Prepare a floppy disk that contains the latest BIOS for the motherboard and the AFUDOS utility. Make sure you download the correct BIOS for your motherboard model.
- 2. Set the jumper to pins 2-3.
- 3. Insert the floppy disk then turn on the system to update the BIOS.
- 4. Shut down the system.
- 5. Set the jumper back to pins 1-2.
- 6. Turn on the system.

2.7 Connectors

2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. PS/2 mouse port (green). This port is for a PS/2 mouse.
- 2. **RJ-45 port for iKVM.** This RJ-45 port functions only when you install ASMB3/iKVM management card.
- 3. PS/2 keyboard port (purple). This port is for a PS/2 keyboard.
- 4. USB 2.0 ports 1 and 2. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0 devices.
- 5. Serial (COM1) port. This 9-pin communication port is for pointing devices or other serial devices.
- 6. Video Graphics Adapter port. This port is for a VGA monitor or other VGAcompatible devices.
- 7. LAN 1 (RJ-45) port. This port allows Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.
- 8. LAN 2 (RJ-45) port. This port allows Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.



2.7.2 Internal connectors

1. Floppy disk drive connector (34-1 pin FLOPPY1)

This connector is for the provided floppy disk drive (FDD) signal cable. Insert one end of the cable to this connector, then connect the other end to the signal connector at the back of the floppy disk drive.

2. IDE connectors (40-1 pin PRI_IDE1, SEC_IDE1)

The onboard IDE connectors are for Ultra DMA 133/100/66 signal cables. There are three connectors on each Ultra DMA 133/100/66 signal cable: blue, black, and gray. Connect the blue connector to the motherboard's IDE connector, then select one of the following modes to configure your device(s).





3. Serial ATA connectors (7-pin SATA1, SATA2, SATA3, SATA4)

Supported by the NVIDIA[®] nForce4[™] chipset, these connectors are for the Serial ATA signal cables for Serial ATA hard disk drives that allows up to 3Gb/s of data transfer rate.

If you installed Serial ATA hard disk drives, you can create a RAID 0, RAID 1, RAID 1+0, RAID 5, or JBOD configuration.







5. USB connector (10-1 pin USB34)




KFSN4-DRE Series USB connector

6. Front and rear fan connectors (3-pin FRNT_FAN1, FRNT_FAN2, FRNT_ FAN3, FRNT_FAN4, REAR_FAN1, REAR_FAN2, REAR_FAN3, REAR_ FAN4, REAR_FAN5, REAR_FAN6)

The fan connectors support cooling fans of 350mA~2000mA (24 W max.) or a total of 1A~3.48A (41.76 W max.) at +12V. Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, making sure that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.


 DO NOT forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! DO NOT place jumper caps on the fan connectors!

7. Serial port connector (10-1 pin COM2)

This connector is for a serial (COM) port. Connect the serial port module cable to this connector, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.





These connectors are for an ATX power supply plugs. The power supply plugs are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.

 DO NOT forget to connect the 8-pin ATX +12 V power plug; otherwise, the system will not boot.


- Use of a PSU with a higher power output is recommended when configuring a system with more power-consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.
- Make sure that your power supply unit (PSU) can provide at least the minimum power required by your system. See the table below for details.

9. Power Supply SMBus connector (5-pin PSUSMB1)



10. SAS connectors (KFSN4-DRE/SAS model only)

This motherboard comes with four Serial Attached SCSI (SAS) connectors, the next-generation storage technology that supports both Series SCSI and Serial ATA (SATA). Each connector supports one device.



KFSN4-DRE Series SAS connectors






11. SAS LSI1064E ports LED connector (18-1 pin SASLED1) (KFSN4-DRE/SAS model only)

This connector is for the front panel LED port indicator that shows the SAS HDD status.




12. Serial General Purpose Input/Output connector (6-pin SGPIO1) This connector is used for the SGPIO peripherals for the LSI MegaRAID SATA LED.



13. Auxiliary panel connector (20-2 pin AUX_PANEL1)

This connector supports several server system functions.



1. Front Panel SMBus (6-1 pin)

This connector allows you to connect SMBus (System Management Bus) devices to the system front panel. Devices communicate with an SMBus host and/or other SMBus devices using the SMBus interface.

2. LAN1 link activity LED (2-pin LAN1_LINKACTLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the LAN1 Activity LED. Connect the LAN1 Activity LED cable to this connector. This LED blinks during a network activity and is always lit when linked.

3. LAN2 link activity LED (2-pin LAN2_LINKACTLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the LAN2 Activity LED. Connect the LAN2 Activity LED cable to this connector. This LED blinks during a network activity and lights up when linked.

4. Chassis Intrusion connector (3-pin CASEOPEN)

This lead is for a chassis with an intrusion detection feature. This requires an external detection mechanism such as a chassis intrusion sensor or microswitch. When you remove any chassis component, the sensor triggers and sends a high-level signal to this lead to record a chassis intrusion event.

5. Locator LED 1 (2-pin LOCATORLED1)

This 2-pin connector is for the Locator LED 1. Connect the Locator LED 1 cable to this connector. This LED lights up when the Locator button is pressed.

6. Locator Button/Switch (2-pin LOCATORBTN)


This connector is for the locator button. This button queries the state of the system locator.

7. Locator LED 2 (2-pin LOCATORLED2)

This 2-pin connector is for the Locator LED 2. Connect the Locator LED 2 cable to this connector.

14. System panel connector (20-1 pin PANEL1)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

The system panel connector is color-coded for easy connection. Refer to the connector description below for details.

System power LED (Green 3-pin POWERLED)

This 3-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

Hard disk drive activity (Red 2-pin HDDLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

If an optional SCSI or SATA add-in card is installed, the read or write activities of any device connected to the SCSI or SATA add-in card causes this LED to light up.

System warning speaker (Orange 4-pin SPKROUT)

This 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted system warning speaker. The speaker allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

Power/Soft-off button (Yellow 2-pin POWERBTN)

This connector is for the system power button. Pressing the power button turns the system ON or puts the system in SLEEP or SOFT-OFF mode depending on the BIOS settings. Pressing the power switch for more than four seconds while the system is ON turns the system OFF.

Reset button (Blue 2-pin RESETBTN)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

This chapter describes the power up sequence, and ways of shutting down the system.

3.1 Starting up for the first time

- 1. After making all the connections, replace the system case cover.
- 2. Be sure that all switches are off.
- 3. Connect the power cord to the power connector at the back of the system chassis.
- 4. Connect the power cord to a power outlet that is equipped with a surge protector.
- 5. Turn on the devices in the following order:
 - a. Monitor
 - b. External SCSI devices (starting with the last device on the chain)
 - c. System power
- 6. After applying power, the system power LED on the system front panel case lights up. For systems with ATX power supplies, the system LED lights up when you press the ATX power button. If your monitor complies with "green" standards or if it has a "power standby" feature, the monitor LED may light up or switch between orange and green after the system LED turns on.

The system then runs the power-on self-test or POST. While the tests are running, the BIOS beeps or additional messages appear on the screen. If you do not see anything within 30 seconds from the time you turned on the power, the system may have failed a power-on test. Check the jumper settings and connections or call your retailer for assistance.

7. At power on, hold down the key to enter the BIOS Setup. Follow the instructions in Chapter 4.

3.2 Powering off the computer

3.2.1 Using the OS shut down function

If you are using Windows® 2000/2003 Server:

- 1. Click the Start button then click Shut Down.
- 2. Select Shut Down from the What do you want the computer to do? list box.
- 3. Select Shutdown Event Tracker.
- 4. Make sure that the Planned check box is checked.
- 5. Select shutdown option from the list box.
- 6. If necessary, key in comments.
- 7. Click OK.

3.2.2 Using the dual function power switch

While the system is ON, pressing the power switch for less than four seconds puts the system to sleep mode or to soft-off mode, depending on the BIOS setting. Pressing the power switch for more than four seconds lets the system enter the soft-off mode regardless of the BIOS setting. Refer to section "4.5 Power Menu" in Chapter 4 for details.

This chapter tells how to change the system settings through the BIOS Setup menus. Detailed descriptions of the BIOS parameters are also provided.

4.1 Managing and updating your BIOS

The following utilities allow you to manage and update the motherboard Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) setup.

- 1. ASUS AFUDOS (Updates the BIOS using a bootable floppy disk)
- 2. **ASUS CrashFree BIOS 2** (Updates the BIOS using a bootable floppy disk or the motherboard support CD when the BIOS file fails or gets corrupted.)

Refer to the corresponding sections for details on these utilities.



Save a copy of the original motherboard BIOS file to a bootable floppy disk or USB flash disk in case you need to restore the BIOS in the future. Copy the original motherboard BIOS using the ASUS Update or AFUDOS utilities.

4.1.1 Creating a bootable floppy disk

1. Do either one of the following to create a bootable floppy disk.

DOS environment

- a. Insert a 1.44MB floppy disk into the drive.
- b. At the DOS prompt, type *format* A:/S then press <Enter>.

Windows® XP environment

- a. Insert a 1.44 MB floppy disk to the floppy disk drive.
- b. Click Start from the Windows® desktop, then select My Computer.
- c. Select the 31/2 Floppy Drive icon.
- d. Click File from the menu, then select Format. A Format 3½ Floppy Disk window appears.
- e. Select Create an MS-DOS startup disk from the format options field, then click Start.

Windows[®] 2000 environment

To create a set of boot disks for Windows® 2000:

- a. Insert a formatted, high density 1.44 MB floppy disk into the drive.
- b. Insert the Windows® 2000 CD to the optical drive.
- c. Click Start, then select Run.
- d. From the Open field, type

D:\bootdisk\makeboot a:

assuming that D: is your optical drive.

- e. Press <Enter>, then follow screen instructions to continue.
- 2. Copy the original or the latest motherboard BIOS file to the bootable floppy disk.

4.1.2 AFUDOS utility

The AFUDOS utility allows you to update the BIOS file in DOS environment using a bootable floppy disk with the updated BIOS file. This utility also allows you to copy the current BIOS file that you can use as backup when the BIOS fails or gets corrupted during the updating process.

Copying the current BIOS

To copy the current BIOS file using the AFUDOS utility:

 Make sure that the floppy disk is not write-protected and has at least 1024KB free space to save the file.

- The succeeding BIOS screens are for reference only. The actual BIOS screen displays may not be same as shown.
- 1. Copy the AFUDOS utility (afudos.exe) from the motherboard support CD to the bootable floppy disk you created earlier.
- 2. Boot the system in DOS mode, then at the prompt type:

afudos /o[filename]

where the [filename] is any user-assigned filename not more than eight alphanumeric characters for the main filename and three alphanumeric characters for the extension name.

Updating the BIOS file

To update the BIOS file using the AFUDOS utility:

1. Visit the ASUS website (www.asus.com) and download the latest BIOS file for the motherboard. Save the BIOS file to a bootable floppy disk.



Write the BIOS filename on a piece of paper. You need to type the exact BIOS filename at the DOS prompt.

- Copy the AFUDOS utility (afudos.exe) from the motherboard support CD to the bootable floppy disk you created earlier.
- 3. Boot the system in DOS mode, then at the prompt type:

4.1.3 ASUS CrashFree BIOS 2 utility

The ASUS CrashFree BIOS 2 is an auto recovery tool that allows you to restore the BIOS file when it fails or gets corrupted during the updating process. You can update a corrupted BIOS file using the motherboard support CD or the floppy disk that contains the updated BIOS file.

- Prepare the motherboard support CD or the floppy disk containing the updated motherboard BIOS before using this utility.
 - Make sure that you rename the original or updated BIOS file in the floppy disk to KFSN4DRE.ROM.

Recovering the BIOS from a floppy disk

To recover the BIOS from a floppy disk:


- 1. Turn on the system.
- Insert the floppy disk with the original or updated BIOS file to the floppy disk drive.

Download the original or the latest BIOS file for this motherboard from ASUS website (support.asus.com/download).

3. The utility displays the following message and automatically checks the floppy disk for the original or updated BIOS file.

Bad BIOS checksum. Starting BIOS recovery ... Checking for floppy...

When found, the utility reads the BIOS file and starts flashing the corrupted BIOS file.





DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS! Doing so can cause system boot failure!

4. Restart the system after the utility completes the updating process.

4.2 BIOS setup program

This motherboard supports a programmable Serial Peripheral Interface (SPI) chip that you can update using the provided utility described in section **4.1 Managing and updating your BIOS**.

Use the BIOS Setup program when you are installing a motherboard, reconfiguring your system, or prompted to "Run Setup." This section explains how to configure your system using this utility.

Even if you are not prompted to use the Setup program, you can change the configuration of your computer in the future. For example, you can enable the security password feature or change the power management settings. This requires you to reconfigure your system using the BIOS Setup program so that the computer can recognize these changes and record them in the CMOS RAM of the SPI chip.


The SPI chip on the motherboard stores the Setup utility. When you start up the computer, the system provides you with the opportunity to run this program. Press during the Power-On Self-Test (POST) to enter the Setup utility; otherwise, POST continues with its test routines.

If you wish to enter Setup after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl+Alt+Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You can also restart by turning the system off and then back on. Do this last option only if the first two failed.

The Setup program is designed to make it as easy to use as possible. Being a menu-driven program, it lets you scroll through the various sub-menus and make your selections from the available options using the navigation keys.

- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply for most conditions to ensure optimum performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to ensure system compatibility and stability. Select the Load Setup Defaults item under the Exit Menu. See section 4.8 Exit Menu.
 - The BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.
 - Visit the ASUS website (www.asus.com) to download the latest BIOS file for this motherboard.

4.2.2 Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

Main	For changing the basic system configuration
Advanced	For changing the advanced system settings

Exit	For selecting the exit options and loading default settings

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

4.2.3 Navigation keys

At the bottom right corner of a menu screen are the navigation keys for that particular menu. Use the navigation keys to select items in the menu and change the settings.



Some of the navigation keys differ from one screen to another.

4.2.4 Menu items

The highlighted item on the menu bar displays the specific items for that menu. For example, selecting Main shows the Main menu items.

The other items (Advanced, Power, Boot, and Exit) on the menu bar have their respective menu items.

4.2.5 Sub-menu items

A solid triangle before each item on any menu screen means that the iteam has a sub-menu. To display the sub-menu, select the item and press <Enter>.

4.2.6 Configuration fields

These fields show the values for the menu items. If an item is user-configurable, you can change the value of the field opposite the item. You cannot select an item that is not user-configurable.

A configurable field is enclosed in brackets, and is highlighted when selected. To change the value of a field, select it then press <Enter> to display a list of options. Refer to **4.2.7 Pop-up window**.

4.2.7 Pop-up window

Select a menu item then press <Enter> to display a pop-up window with the configuration options for that item.

4.2.8 Scroll bar

If you attempt to exit the Setup program without saving your changes, the program prompts you with a message asking if you want to save your changes before exiting. Press <Enter> to save the changes while exiting.

Exit & Discard Changes

Select this option only if you do not want to save the changes that you made to the Setup program. If you made changes to fields other than System Date, System Time, and Password, the BIOS asks for a confirmation before exiting.

Discard Changes

This option allows you to discard the selections you made and restore the previously saved values. After selecting this option, a confirmation appears. Select **YES** to discard any changes and load the previously saved values.

Load Setup Defaults

This option allows you to load the default values for each of the parameters on the Setup menus. When you select this option or if you press <F5>, a confirmation window appears. Select **YES** to load default values. Select **Exit & Save Changes** or make other changes before saving the values to the non-volatile RAM.

5.1 Setting up RAID

The motherboard comes with the following RAID solutions:

KFSN4-DRE; KFSN4-DRE/2S model

 The NVIDIA[®] nForce Professional 2200 chipset comes with a built-in SATA RAID controller that allows you to configure RAID 0 and RAID 1 with SATA hard disk drives.

KFSN4-DRE/SAS model

- The NVIDIA[®] nForce Professional 2200 chipset comes with a built-in SATA RAID controller that allows you to configure RAID 0 and RAID 1 with SATA hard disk drives.
- LSI1064E PCI-E SAS controller supports SAS disk drives and RAID0, RAID1, and RAID1E configuration.

5.1.1 RAID definitions

RAID 0 (*Data striping*) optimizes two identical hard disk drives to read and write data in parallel, interleaved stacks. Two hard disks perform the same work as a single drive but at a sustained data transfer rate, double that of a single disk alone, thus improving data access and storage. Use of two new identical hard disk drives is required for this setup.

RAID 1 (*Data mirroring*) copies and maintains an identical image of data from one drive to a second drive. If one drive fails, the disk array management software directs all applications to the surviving drive as it contains a complete copy of the data in the other drive. This RAID configuration provides data protection and increases fault tolerance to the entire system. Use two new drives or use an existing drive and a new drive for this setup. The new drive must be of the same size or larger than the existing drive.

RAID 1-E (Enhanced RAID 1) has a striped layout with each stripe unit having a secondary (or alternate) copy stored on a different disk. You can use three or more hard disk drives for this configuration.



If you want to boot the system from a hard disk drive included in a created RAID set, copy first the RAID driver from the support CD to a floppy disk before you install an operating system to the selected hard disk drive.

5.1.2 Installing hard disk drives

The motherboard supports Serial ATA for RAID set configuration. For optimal performance, install identical drives of the same model and capacity when creating a disk array.

To install the SATA hard disks for RAID configuration:

- 1. Install the SATA hard disks into the drive bays following the instructions in the system user guide.
- 2. Connect a SATA signal cable to the signal connector at the back of each drive and to the SATA connector on the motherboard.
- 3. Connect a SATA power cable to the power connector on each drive.

5.1.3 Setting the BIOS RAID items

After installing the hard disk drives, make sure to set the necessary RAID items in the BIOS before setting your RAID configuration.

To set the BIOS RAID items:

- 1. Enter the BIOS Setup during POST.
- 2. Go to the Main Menu, select IDE Configuration, then press <Enter>.
- 3. Set the RAID Option ROM item to [Enabled], then press <Enter>. The master and slave drive list appears.
- 4. Enable the drives you want to set as RAID.
- 5. Save your changes, then exit the BIOS Setup.

- Refer to Chapter 5 for details on entering and navigating through the BIOS Setup.
- The RAID BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference only, and may not exactly match the items on your screen.

5.1.4 RAID configuration utilities

You can create a RAID set using the utility embedded in each RAID controller. For example, you can use the NVIDIA® RAID Utility if you installed SATA hard disk drives to the SATA connectors supported by the NVIDIA® nForce Professional 2200 chip. Refer to the succeeding sections for details on how to enter the RAID configuration utility.

For KFSN4-DRE/SAS model, you may use the LSI1064E SAS Configuration Utility if you installed SAS hard disk drives to the SAS connector(s) supported by the LSI1064E PCI-E SAS controller.

Refer to the succeeding sections for details on how to use each RAID configuration utility.

5.2 NVIDIA[®] RAID configurations

The motherboard includes a high performance SATA RAID controller integrated in the NVIDIA® nForce Professional 2200 chip. The RAID controller supports RAID 0 and RAID 1 using the four independent Serial ATA channels.

5.2.1 Entering the NVIDIA® RAID Utility

To enter the NVIDIA® RAID Utility:

- 1. Restart the computer.
- 2. During POST, press <F10> to display the utility main menu.


5.2.2 Creating a RAID Volume

To create a RAID 0 set:

 From the Define a New Array menu, select **RAID Mode**, then press
 Enter>. A pop-up menu appears.Use the up or down arrow keys to select a RAID mode, then press <Enter>. You can select either Mirroring, Striping, Spanning, Stripe Mirroring, or RAID 5.

The default stripe size is optimal (64KB). You must choose the stripe size value based on the projected drive usage. For low disk usage, select 4 KB/16 KB. For typical disk usage, select 64 KB. Select 128KB for performance disk usage.



For server systems, we recommend using a lower array block size. For multimedia computer systems used mainly for audio and video editing, we recommend a higher array block size for optimum performance.

 Press <TAB> to move to the Free Disks section. Highlight the hard disk drives that you want to add in the RAID set, then press the right arrow key to select. The selected hard disk drives appear in the Array Disks section. Repeat the process until all desired hard disk drives are added.

2. The Select New Array Type screen appears.




You may configure one disk as a global hot spare to protect critical data on the IM/ IME volume(s). You may create the hot spare disk at the same time you create the IM/IME volume. Refer to this section when adding a hot spare disk on an existing volume.



If a disk on an IM/IME volume fails, the utility automatically rebuilds the failed disk data on the hot spare. When the failed disk is replaced, the utility assigns the replacement as the new hot spare.

To create a hot spare:

- 1. Follow steps 1 ~ 3 of the section Viewing volume properties.

Synchronizing the array

Synchronizing the array allows the utility to resynchronize data on the mirrored disk in the array. This procedure is seldom required because data synchronization is automatically done during normal operation.





Selecting a boot disk

You can select a boot disk in the **SAS Topology** screen. This disk is then moved to scan ID 0 on the next boot, and remains at this position. This makes it easier to set BIOS boot device options and to keep the boot device constant during device additions and removals. There can be only one boot disk.

Follow these steps to select a boot disk:

- 1. In the LSI Logic Config Utility, select an adapter from the Adapter List.
- 2. Select the **SAS Topology** option.

The current topology is displayed. If the selection of a boot device is supported, the bottom of the screen lists the **Alt+B** option. This is the key for toggling the boot device. If a device is currently configured as the boot device, the **Device Info** column on the **SAS Topology** screen will show the word **Boot**.

- 3. To select a boot disk, move the cursor to the disk and press Alt+B.
- 4. To remove the boot designator, move the cursor to the disk and press Alt+B. This controller will no longer have a disk designated as boot.
- 5. To change the boot disk, move the cursor to the new boot disk and press **Alt+B**. The boot designator will move to this disk.

6.1 RAID driver installation

After creating the RAID sets for your server system, you are now ready to install an operating system to the independent hard disk drive or bootable array. This part provides instructions on how to install the RAID controller drivers during OS installation.

6.1.1 Creating a RAID driver disk




You may have to use another system to create the RAID driver disk from the system/motherboard support CD or from the Internet.

A floppy disk with the RAID driver is required when installing Windows[®] 2000/XP operating system on a hard disk drive that is included in a RAID set. You can create a RAID driver disk in DOS (using the Makedisk application in the support CD) or in Windows[®] environment.

To create a RAID driver disk in DOS environment:

- 1. Place the motherboard support CD in the optical drive.
- 2. Restart the computer, then enter the BIOS Setup.
- 3. Select the optical drive as the first boot priority to boot from the support CD. Save your changes, then exit the BIOS Setup.
- 4. Restart the computer.
- 5. Press any key when prompted to boot from CD.



The Makedisk menu appears.




6. Use the arrow keys to select the type of RAID driver disk you want to ceate and press <Enter> to enter the sub-menu.

- 7. Locate the RAID driver and place a blank, high-density floppy disk to the floppy disk drive.
- 8. Press <Enter>.
- 9. Follow screen instructions to create the driver disk.

To create a RAID driver disk in Windows®:

- 1. Place the motherboard support CD in the optical drive.
- 2. When the Drivers menu appears, click **nVIDIA nForce(TM) SATA RAID Driver** to create an nVIDIA nForce SATA RAID driver disk.



To install the RAID driver:

- Install an operating system to the selected hard disk drive. During installation, the computer prompts you to press the <F6> if you are installing a third-party SCSI or RAID driver.
- 2. Press <F6>, then insert the RAID driver disk to the floppy disk drive.
- 3. Follow screen instructions to install the RAID drivers.

6.1.2 Installing the RAID controller driver

1. Boot the computer using the Windows[®] 2000/2003 Server installation CD. The Windows[®] 2000/2003 Setup starts.



- 2. Press <F6> when the message "Press F6 if you need to install a third party SCSI or RAID driver..." appears at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. When prompted, press <S> to specify an additional device.



4. Insert the RAID driver disk you created earlier to the floppy disk drive, then press <Enter>.



5. Select the NVIDIA RAID CLASS DRIVER (required), then press <Enter>.



6. Press <S> again at the Specigy Devices screen, then press <Enter>.

7. Select NVIDIA RAID CLASS DRIVER (required), then press <Enter>. The following windows appears listing both drivers.



8. Press <Enter> to continuen with Windows[®] 2000/2003 installation.



DO NOT remove the floppy disk until the blue screen portion of Windows $^{\circledast}$ 2000/2003 installation is completed.

6.2 LAN driver installation

To install the LAN controller drivers:

- Insert the motherboard/system support CD to the optical drive. The CD automatically displays the Drivers menu if Autorun is enabled in your computer.



- Windows[®] automatically detects the LAN controllers and displays a New Hardware Found window. Click Cancel to close this window.
- If Autorun is NOT enabled in your computer, browse the contents of the support CD to locate the file ASSETUP.EXE from the BIN folder. Doubleclick the ASSETUP.EXE to run the CD.
- 3. Click the Broadcom 5721 Driver to begin installation.








